## Speaker Biographies

### MEL CAPPE

Mel Cappe is a Professor with the School of Public Policy and Governance at the University of Toronto. From 2006-2011 he was President of the Institute for Research on Public Policy. Prior to that for four years he was High Commissioner for Canada to the United Kingdom. Before that he served as Clerk of the Privy Council, Secretary to the Cabinet and Head of the Public Service in Ottawa. Earlier in his career he held senior economic and policy positions in the Departments of Finance and Industry. He was Deputy Secretary to the Treasury Board, Deputy Minister of the Environment, Deputy Minister of Human Resources Development, Deputy Minister of Labour and Chairman of the Employment Insurance Commission. He is an Officer of the Order of Canada.

### MIKE FENN

Mike Fenn is a Senior Advisor at StrategyCorp and President of Fenn Advisory Services. Michael served seven years as an Ontario Deputy Minister and eleven years as chief municipal administrator in Burlington and Hamilton-Wentworth Region. More recently, he held a succession of CEO positions, providing executive leadership to new or transitioning organizations, including the regional health authority Mississauga-Halton LHIN, regional transportation authority Metrolinx, eHealth Ontario, Canadian Urban Institute, and Institute of Public Administration of Canada.

### JENNIFER GOLD

Jennifer Gold is the practice lead for government transformation at the Mowat Centre. She holds a Ph.D. from the University of Cambridge and was a Visiting Fellow at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government in 2009. She has previously worked at the UK's Institute for Government, Demos, and Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

### SUNIL JOHAL

Sunil Johal is Policy Director at the Mowat Centre. Previously, he was a Director with the Ontario Ministry of Economic Development and Innovation and has also held senior management and policy roles with the Cabinet Office, Ministries of Finance and Intergovernmental Affairs and federal Treasury Board Secretariat.

### MATTHEW MENDELSON

Matthew Mendelsohn is the founding Director of the Mowat Centre.
